## **Homeplay Feedback Guidelines:**

Dear Mentoring persons,

In order to assist your readers and to helping the tracking and filing of the feedbacks, we ask that you read and use this guide before writing your Homeplay feedback to your mentee.

## **Short Checklist**

- Heading
- List Skills in order
- Feedback on each example
- Be specific
- Praise
- Love what you're doing
- Set up contacts
- Please put a **heading on your Homeplay feedback** page with the following:
  - "Homeplay feedback for"
    - which homeplay assignment (HP1, HP2, HP3)
    - Mentee
      - name and MLP Level (Improvisor, Apprentice, Mentor,)
  - "Mentoring person" or "from"
    - your name and MfP Level (Mentor, Leader, Grad) the date
- Please <u>list each skill in the order that it appears</u> on the Homeplay assignment pages (If mentee has recorded out order, list skills as they appear on the recording). ...and gently remind them to please record the next HP in the order listed in the assignment.

-OVER-

- Give feedback **for each of the Homeplay examples.**Congratulate, praise, describe, praise, support, explain, praise.....
  - Offer specifics about your observations.
    - <u>Describe at least one thing</u> that you enjoy or notice <u>as a plus</u> in the example, i.e., praise.
    - Point out <u>unique aspects</u> of the individual's sounds and examples. Whatever appreciation comes up for you when listening, be sure to express that in some way.
    - Offer <u>supportive suggestions</u> either for:
      - further exploration of this skill
        - more in depth grasp of the skill
        - going to the next level
      - clarification of a misconception
      - examples (verbal or sources for listening)
      - instructions (if you feel confident) for learning the skill if one is a novice or suggestions on how to find someone to work with to help acquire the skill.
    - Where appropriate, <u>share your own experiences</u> either in practice, process, as a mentee, etc. Concrete personal examples of one's own experiences help your mentees feel less isolated in their journey.
- **Remind your mentee(s)** 
  - To **keep up with** phone and email **contacts** with you. Suggest times or set up regular intervals in advance.
  - To practice noticing their greatness.
- **S** Extras
  - As your mentee is unique, you are also unique in your mentoring.
  - Use your
    - o intuition.
    - your experience
    - your personal wisdom,
    - previous examples of fine mentoring, etc.

Only you can be the mentor that you are. What you have to offer is awesome. **Generosity** in this case is understanding that you have something special to give as well as practicing empathy with the person who is receiving your feedback.
